

Common Opioid Drugs and Signs and Symptoms of Overdose

List of Common Opioid Drugs

Not all opioid drugs are illegal, but they all have the potential to cause overdose. The drugs listed below fall into the opioid family of drugs:

- Codeine
- Fentanyl (Actiq, Duragesic, Fentora)
- Hydrocodone (Hysingla ER, Zohydro ER)
- Hydrocodone/acetaminophen (Lorcet, Lortab, Norco, Vicodin)
- Hydromorphone (Dilaudid, Exalgo)
- Meperidine (Demerol)
- Methadone (Dolophine, Methadose)
- Morphine (Astramorph, Avinza, Kadian, MS Contin, Ora-Morph SR)
- Oxycodone (OxyContin, Oxecta, Roxicodone)
- Oxycodone and acetaminophen (Percocet, Endocet, Roxicet)
- Heroin



Opioid drug misuse and abuse are growing public health emergencies.

Signs and Symptoms of an Opioid Overdose

A person experiencing an opioid overdose may have some or all of the following signs and symptoms:

- Decreased level of consciousness
- Pinpoint pupils
- Gurgling or choking noises
- Body is limp
- Breathing slows or stops
- Heart rate slows or stops
- Blue lips and/or nail beds
- Clammy skin
- Can't be woken or can't speak,
